



St Nicholas' School Pupil Acceptable Use & E-Safety agreement

All pupils use computer facilities including Internet access as an essential part of learning, as required by the National Curriculum. Both pupils and their parents/carers are asked to sign to show that the Acceptable Use and e-Safety rules have been understood and agreed.

Use of Devices in School

- The School owned equipment and network must be used appropriately
- The Computer system is available for educational use only
- I will only log on with my own username and password
- I understand the school monitors use of the information systems
- Printing: I will make sure my work is finished and checked and only print when instructed to do so.
- I will take care when using the equipment so as not to cause damage

If I do not follow these rules then I might miss an ICT lesson or my parents might have to talk to my teacher or the Headteacher about what I have done.

These rules help us to stay safe on the Internet:

- I ask permission before using the Internet.
- I only use websites that an adult has chosen or helped me to choose.
- I tell an adult immediately if I see or read anything I am uncomfortable with and switch my screen off.
- I only use the Internet if an adult is in the room with me.
- I only e-mail people an adult has approved.
- I only send e mails and messages when these are the topic for the lesson, and they are always polite and friendly.
- I never give out personal information about myself or others or passwords.
- I never arrange to meet anyone.
- I do not open e-mails sent by anyone I don't know.
- I do not use Internet chat rooms.
